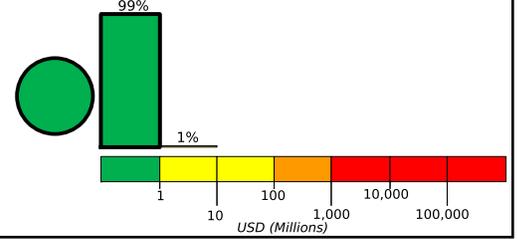
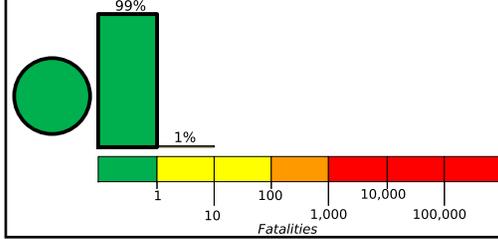



### Structures:

Overall, the population in this region resides in structures that are highly vulnerable to earthquake shaking, though some resistant structures exist.
