Synopsis	This short, seemingly isolated, northeast-striking normal fault is on piedmont slope near Atlanta Landing Field in southernmost Spring Valley. Reconnaissance photogeologic mapping of this fault is the source of data. Trench investigations and studies of scarp morphology have not been completed.
Name comments	Refers to a short fault mapped by Schell (1981 #2844) and also by Dohrenwend and others (1991 #287). Fault is in southernmost Spring Valley at the Atlanta Landing Field, about 5 km north of Atlanta.

Original mapping by Schell (1981 #2843; 1981 #2844) based on photogeologic analysis of primarily 1:24,000-scale color aerial photography supplemented with 1:60,000-scale black-and-white aerial photography, transferred by inspection to 1:62,500-scale topographic maps and photographically reduced and directly transferred to 1:250,000-scale topographic maps, and field verification. Mapping by Dohrenwend and others (1991 #287) based on photogeologic analysis of 1:58,000-nominal-scale color-infrared photography transferred directly to 1:100,000-scale topographic quadrangle maps enlarged to scale of the photographs.</p>
